- I feel as if the Town is heading to becoming another Cary (which is the antithesis to what I believe are Hillsborough's strengths). In particular, Collins Ridge represents that for me, ran shop owners out 3 years ago and left their buildings to become trashed, dilapidated and dangerous. It was also a horrible eye sore, definitely not good PR. And once it is complete we have another bunch of high-priced housing and even more traffic in that part of Hillsborough. I know it helps the tax base, but I suspect some residents might move out of Hillsborough if this continues. I have lived here 25 years and stay connected to town projects, etc. but I felt that I had absolutely no say in Collins Ridge.
- I hate how the downtown and historic district got new/wider sidewalks and crosswalks, whereas areas outside of this (like farther north and south on Churton, where people without cars have to walk on the road or cross at dangerous intersections, and it is really dangerous) don't get the same benefits. I've asked the town staff about these things, and I know there are issues with the road being a state road, or "we can't put a crosswalk at Corbin Street because there is no sidewalk, and the ADA says crosswalks have to lead to sidewalks." But really? It's been 14 years since I moved here, and nothing could be done in 14 years. Is anyone even trying? To be clear, I do not think we need a sidewalk on my street, but rather on the main streets that people without cars need to walk on to get to town, the bus stop, or the shopping center. How about a speed bump to slow cars that are speeding south on Churton toward the (blind) Corbin intersection where someone might be scurrying across the road? I had to cross on ice once to get to the bus stop at 6 AM, and it was terrifying. Or a button to trigger the light, since bikes/pedestrians cannot set it off with the metal detector? I'll take anything that would make that intersection safer.
- I hate not having sidewalks in Fairview and on US 70/Cornelius. It is dangerous. I take the bus from US 70 to Chapel Hill, as do many mothers with young children. I worry that someone is going to get hit. We need sidewalks ASAP.

- I live in Beckett's Ridge at I can't easily walk or bike to downtown. There are walkways or sidewalks I can use. A local bus service that ran through local neighborhoods would be nice.
